

## **Romanby Primary School**

### **Pupil Remote Learning Policy**

Please note: From 22 October 2020 until the end of the 2020/2021 academic year, schools have a legal duty to provide remote education to all children who require it. More details can be found in Appendix A.

#### **Statement of intent**

At Romanby Primary School we understand the need to continually deliver high quality education, including during periods of remote learning – whether for an individual pupil or many. We recognise the importance of maintaining high expectations in all areas of school life and ensuring that all children have access to the learning resources and support they need to succeed.

Through the implementation of this policy, we aim to address the key concerns associated with remote learning, such as online safety, access to educational resources, data protection, and safeguarding.

This policy aims to:

- Minimise the disruption to children' education and the delivery of the curriculum.
- Ensure provision is in place so that all children have access to high quality learning resources.
- Protect children from the risks associated with using devices connected to the internet.
- Ensure staff, parent, and pupil data remains secure and is not lost or misused.
- Ensure robust safeguarding measures continue to be in effect during the period of remote learning.
- Ensure all children have the provision they need to complete their work to the best of their ability, and to remain happy, healthy, and supported during periods of remote learning.

## 1. Legal framework

1.1 This policy has due regard to all relevant legislation and statutory guidance including, but not limited to, the following:

- Equality Act 2010
- Education Act 2004
- The General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR)
- Data Protection Act 2018

This policy has due regard to national guidance including, but not limited to, the following:

- DfE (2020) 'Keeping children safe in education'

## 2. Roles and responsibilities

2.1. The governing body is responsible for:

- Ensuring that the school has robust risk management procedures in place.
- Ensuring that the school has a business continuity plan in place, where required.
- Evaluating the effectiveness of the school's remote learning arrangements.

2.2. The headteacher is responsible for:

- Ensuring that staff, parents and children adhere to the relevant policies at all times.
- Ensuring that there are arrangements in place for identifying, evaluating, and managing the risks associated with remote learning.
- Ensuring that there are arrangements in place for monitoring incidents associated with remote learning.

- Overseeing that the school has the resources necessary to action the procedures in this policy.
- Reviewing the effectiveness of this policy on an annual basis and communicating any changes to staff, parents, and children.
- Arranging any additional training staff may require to support children during the period of remote learning.
- Conducting reviews of the remote learning arrangements to ensure children' education does not suffer.

2.3. The health and safety officer is responsible for:

- Ensuring that the relevant health and safety risk assessments are carried out within the agreed timeframes, in collaboration with the headteacher.
- Putting procedures and safe systems of learning into practice, which are designed to eliminate or reduce the risks associated with remote learning.
- Ensuring that children identified as being at risk are provided with necessary information and instruction, as required.
- Managing the effectiveness of health and safety measures through a robust system of reporting, investigating, and recording incidents.

2.4. The DPO is responsible for:

- Overseeing that all school-owned electronic devices used for remote learning have adequate anti-virus software and malware protection.
- Ensuring all staff, parents, and children are aware of the data protection principles outlined in the GDPR.
- Ensuring that all computer programs used for remote learning are compliant with the GDPR and the Data Protection Act 2018.
- Overseeing that any ICT equipment used for remote learning is resilient and can efficiently recover lost data.

2.5. The DSL is responsible for:

- Attending and arranging, where necessary, any safeguarding meetings that occur during the remote learning period.
- Liaising with the ICT technician to ensure that all technology used for remote learning is suitable for its purpose and will protect children online.
- Identifying vulnerable children who may be at risk if they are learning remotely.
- Ensuring that child protection plans are enforced while the pupil is learning remotely, and liaising with the headteacher and other organisations to make alternate arrangements for children who are at a high risk, where required.
- Identifying the level of support or intervention required while children learn remotely and ensuring appropriate measures are in place.
- Liaising with relevant individuals to ensure vulnerable children receive the support required during the period of remote working Ensuring all safeguarding incidents are adequately recorded and reported.

2.6. The SENCO is responsible for:

- Liaising with the ICT technician to ensure that the technology used for remote learning is accessible to all children and that reasonable adjustments are made where required.
- Ensuring that children with EHC plans continue to have their needs met while learning remotely, and liaising with the headteacher and other organisations to make any alternate arrangements for children with EHC plans and IHPs.
- Identifying the level of support or intervention that is required while children with SEND learn remotely.
- Ensuring that the provision put in place for children with SEND is monitored for effectiveness throughout the duration of the remote learning period.

2.7. The finance staff have responsibility for:

- Arranging the procurement of any equipment or technology required for staff to teach remotely and for children to learn from home.
- Ensuring value for money when arranging the procurement of equipment or technology.
- Ensuring that the school has adequate insurance to cover all remote working arrangements.

2.8. The ICT technician is responsible for:

- Ensuring that all school-owned devices used for remote learning have suitable anti-virus software installed, have a secure connection, can recover lost work, and allow for audio and visual material to be recorded, where required.
- Ensuring that any programs or networks used for remote learning can effectively support a large number of users at one time, where required, e.g. undertaking 'stress' testing.
- Working with the SENCO to ensure that the equipment and technology used for learning remotely is accessible to all children and staff.

2.9. Staff members are responsible for:

- Adhering to this policy at all times during periods of remote learning.
- Reporting any health and safety incidents to the health and safety officer and asking for guidance as appropriate.
- Reporting any safeguarding incidents to the DSL and asking for guidance as appropriate.
- Taking part in any training conducted to meet the requirements of this policy, including training on how to use the necessary electronic equipment and software.
- Reporting any dangers or potential dangers they identify, as well as any concerns they may have about remote learning, to the headteacher.
- Reporting any defects on school-owned equipment used for remote learning to an ICT technician.
- Adhering to the Staff Code of Conduct at all times.

2.10. Parents are responsible for:

- Adhering to this policy at all times during periods of remote learning.
- Ensuring their child is available to learn remotely and that the schoolwork set is completed on time and to the best of their child's ability.
- Reporting any technical issues to the school as soon as possible.
- Ensuring that their child always has access to remote learning material

- Reporting any absence in line with the terms set out in section 9.
- Ensuring their child uses the equipment and technology used for remote learning as intended.
- Adhering to the Parent Code of Conduct at all times.

2.11. Children are responsible for:

- Adhering to this policy at all times during periods of remote learning.
- Ensuring they are available to learn remotely and that their schoolwork is completed on time and to the best of their ability.
- Reporting any technical issues to their teacher as soon as possible.
- Ensuring they have access to remote learning material and notifying a responsible adult if they do not have access.
- Notifying a responsible adult if they are feeling unwell or are unable to complete the schoolwork they have been set.
- Ensuring they use any equipment and technology for remote learning as intended.
- Adhering to the Behavioural Policy at all times.

### **3. Resources**

#### **Learning materials**

- 3.1. The school will accept a range of different teaching methods during remote learning to help explain concepts and address misconceptions easily. For the purpose of providing remote learning, the school may make use of:
- Work booklets/packs
  - MS Teams
  - Marvellous Me
  - Past and mock test papers
  - Current online learning portals
  - Educational websites
  - Reading tasks
  - Pre-recorded video or audio lessons
- 3.2. Teachers will review the DfE's list of [online education resources](#) and utilise these tools as necessary, in addition to existing resources.
- 3.3. Reasonable adjustments will be made to ensure that all children have access to the resources needed for effective remote learning.
- 3.4. Teachers will ensure the programmes chosen for online learning have a range of accessibility features, e.g. voice-to-text conversion, to support children with SEND.
- 3.5. Lesson plans will be adapted to ensure that the curriculum remains fully accessible and inclusive via remote learning.
- 3.6. The school will review the resources children have access to and adapt learning to account for all children needs by using a range of different formats, e.g. providing work on PDFs which can easily be printed from a mobile device.

- 3.7. Work packs will be made available for children who do not have access to a printer – these packs can be collected from school.
- 3.8. Teaching staff will liaise with the SENCO and other relevant members of staff to ensure all children remain fully supported for the duration of the remote learning period.
- 3.9. The SENCO will arrange additional support for children with SEND which will be unique to the individual's needs, e.g. via weekly phone calls.
- 3.10. Any issues with remote learning resources will be reported as soon as possible to the relevant member of staff.
- 3.11. Children will be required to use their own or family-owned equipment to access remote learning resources, unless the school agrees to provide or loan equipment, e.g. laptops.
- 3.12. For children who cannot access digital devices at home, the school will, where possible, apply for technology support through their LA.
- 3.13. Children and parents will be required to maintain the upkeep of any equipment they use to access remote learning resources.
- 3.14. Teaching staff will oversee academic progression for the duration of the remote learning period and will mark and provide feedback on work in line with [section 7](#) of this policy.
- 3.15. The arrangements for any 'live' classes, e.g. webinars, will be communicated via email no later than one day before the allotted time and kept to a reasonable length of no more than one hour per session.
- 3.16. The ICT technician is not responsible for providing technical support for equipment that is not owned by the school.

### **Food provision**

- 3.17. The school will signpost parents via email towards additional support for ensuring their children continue to receive the food they need, e.g. food banks.
- 3.18. Where applicable, the school may provide the following provision for children who receive FSM:
  - Keeping the school kitchen open during lunchtimes
  - Making food parcels available for delivery or collection
  - Providing vouchers to families

### **Costs and expenses**

- 3.19. If a pupil is provided with school-owned equipment, the pupil and their parent will sign and adhere to the Technology Acceptable Use Agreement prior to commencing remote learning.

## **4. Online safety**

- 4.1. This section of the policy will be enacted in conjunction with the school's Online Safety Policy.

- 4.2. Where possible, all interactions will be textual and public.
- 4.3. All staff and children using video communication must:
  - Communicate in groups – one-to-one sessions are not permitted.
  - Wear suitable clothing – this includes others in their household.
  - Be situated in a suitable 'public' living area within the home with an appropriate background – 'private' living areas within the home, such as bedrooms, are not permitted during video communication.
  - Use appropriate language – this includes others in their household.
  - Maintain the standard of behaviour expected in school.
  - Use the necessary equipment and computer programs as intended.
  - Not record, store, or distribute video material without permission.
  - Ensure they have a stable connection to avoid disruption to lessons.
  - Always remain aware that they are visible.
- 4.4. All staff and children using audio communication must:
  - Use appropriate language – this includes others in their household.
  - Maintain the standard of behaviour expected in school.
  - Use the necessary equipment and computer programs as intended.
  - Not record, store, or distribute audio material without permission.
  - Ensure they have a stable connection to avoid disruption to lessons.
  - Always remain aware that they can be heard.
- 4.5. The school will consider whether one-to-one sessions are appropriate in some circumstances, e.g. to provide support for children with SEND. This will be decided and approved by the SLT, in collaboration with the SENCO.
- 4.6. Issues involving children not using devices or software as intended will be addressed in line with the Behaviour Policy.
- 4.7. The school will risk assess the technology used for remote learning prior to use and ensure that there are no privacy issues or scope for inappropriate use.
- 4.8. The school will ensure that all school-owned equipment and technology used for remote learning has suitable anti-virus software installed, can establish secure connections, can recover lost work, and allows for audio and visual material to be downloaded, where required.
- 4.9. The school will communicate to parents via letter about any precautionary measures that need to be put in place if their child is learning remotely using their own/family-owned equipment and technology, e.g. ensuring that their internet connection is secure.
- 4.10. During the period of remote learning, the school will maintain regular contact with parents to:
  - Reinforce the importance of children staying safe online.
  - Ensure parents are aware of what their children are being asked to do, e.g. sites they have been asked to use and staff they will interact with.

- Encourage them to set age-appropriate parental controls on devices and internet filters to block malicious websites.
  - Direct parents to useful resources to help them keep their children safe online.
- 4.11. The school will not be responsible for providing access to the internet off the school premises and will not be responsible for providing online safety software, e.g. anti-virus software, on devices not owned by the school.

## **5. Safeguarding**

- 5.1. This section of the policy will be enacted in conjunction with the school's Child Protection Policy, which has been updated to include safeguarding procedures in relation to remote working.
- 5.2. The DSL and headteacher will identify 'vulnerable' children (children who are deemed to be vulnerable or are at risk of harm) via risk assessment prior to the period of remote learning.
- 5.3. The DSL will arrange for regular contact to be made with vulnerable children, prior to the period of remote learning.
- 5.4. Phone calls made to vulnerable children will be made using school phones where possible.
- 5.5. The DSL will arrange for regular contact with vulnerable children with additional contact, including home visits, arranged where required.
- 5.6. All contact with vulnerable children will be recorded on paper and suitably stored in line with the Records Management Policy.
- 5.7. The DSL will keep in contact with vulnerable children's social workers or other care professionals during the period of remote working, as required.
- 5.8. Any home visits will:
- Have at least one suitably trained individual present.
  - Be undertaken by no fewer than two members of staff.
  - Be suitably recorded on paper and the records stored so that the DSL has access to them.
  - Actively involve the pupil.
- 5.9. Vulnerable children will be provided with a means of contacting the DSL, their deputy, or any other relevant member of staff – this arrangement will be set up by the DSL prior to the period of remote learning.
- 5.10. The DSL will meet (in person or remotely) with the relevant members of staff to discuss new and current safeguarding arrangements for vulnerable children learning remotely.
- 5.11. All members of staff will report any safeguarding concerns to the DSL immediately.
- 5.12. Children and their parents will be encouraged to contact the DSL if they wish to report safeguarding concerns, e.g. regarding harmful or upsetting content or incidents of online

bullying. The school will also signpost families to the practical support that is available for reporting these concerns.

## **6. Data protection**

- 6.1. This section of the policy will be enacted in conjunction with the school's Data Protection Policy.
- 6.2. Staff members will be responsible for adhering to the GDPR when teaching remotely and will ensure the confidentiality and integrity of their devices at all times.
- 6.3. Sensitive data will only be transferred between devices if it is necessary to do so for the purpose of remote learning and teaching.
- 6.4. Any data that is transferred between devices will be suitably encrypted or have other data protection measures in place so that if the data is lost, stolen, or subject to unauthorised access, it remains safe until recovered.
- 6.5. Parents' and children' up-to-date contact details will be collected prior to the period of remote learning.
- 6.6. All contact details will be stored in line with the Data Protection Policy and retained in line with the Records Management Policy.
- 6.7. The school will not permit paper copies of contact details to be taken off the school premises.
- 6.8. Children are not permitted to let their family members or friends use any school-owned equipment which contains personal data.
- 6.9. Any breach of confidentiality will be dealt with in accordance with the school's Data and E-Security Breach Prevention Management Plan.
- 6.10. Any intentional breach of confidentiality will be dealt with in accordance with the school's Behavioural Policy or the Disciplinary Policy and Procedure.

## **7. Marking and feedback**

- 7.1. All schoolwork completed through remote learning must be:
  - Finished when returned to the relevant member of teaching staff.
  - Returned on or before the deadline set by the relevant member of teaching staff.
  - Completed to the best of the pupil's ability.
  - The pupil's own work.
  - Marked in line with the Marking and Feedback Policy.
  - Where applicable, feedback will be given
- 7.2. The school expects children and staff to maintain a good work ethic during the period of remote learning.
- 7.3. Children are accountable for the completion of their own schoolwork – teaching staff will contact parents if their child is not completing their schoolwork or their standard of work has noticeably decreased.

- 7.4. Teaching staff will monitor the academic progress of children with and without access to the online learning resources and discuss additional support or provision with the headteacher as soon as possible.
- 7.5. Teaching staff will monitor the academic progress of children with SEND and discuss additional support or provision with the SENCO as soon as possible.
- 7.6. The school accepts a variety of formative assessment and feedback methods, e.g. through quizzes and other digital tools from teachers, and will support them with implementing these measures for remote learning where possible.
- 7.7. The school will log participation and pupil engagement with remote education, as well as motivation levels and progress, and this will be reported to parents via formal regular reports or, if there is a concern, individually via telephone.
- 7.8. The school will consider ways to use feedback to secure consistent engagement with remote material, e.g. introducing a newsletter sent to parents and children which displays exemplary work and rewards engagement or outcomes.

## **8. Health and safety**

- 8.1. This section of the policy will be enacted in conjunction with the school's Health and Safety Policy.
- 8.2. Teaching staff will ensure children are shown how to use the necessary equipment and technology safely and correctly prior to the period of remote learning.
- 8.3. If using electronic devices during remote learning, children will be encouraged to take regular screen breaks.
- 8.4. If any incidents or near-misses occur in a pupil's home, they or their parents are required to report these to the relevant member of staff immediately so that appropriate action can be taken.

## **9. School day and absence**

- 9.1. Parents will make suitable arrangements for their children to complete any remote learning tasks. This may depend upon their work/childcare arrangements.
- 9.2. Children with SEND or additional medical conditions who require more regular breaks, e.g. sensory breaks, are not expected to do schoolwork during their breaks.
- 9.3. Children who are unwell are not expected to be present for remote working until they are well enough to do so.
- 9.4. Parents will inform the school office via email no later than 8:30am if their child is unwell.
- 9.5. The school will monitor absence and lateness in line with the Attendance Policy.

## **10. Communication**

- 10.1. The school will ensure adequate channels of communication are arranged in the event of an emergency.

- 10.2. The school will communicate with parents via email, Marvellous Me and the school website about remote learning arrangements as soon as possible.
- 10.3. The headteacher will communicate with staff as soon as possible via email about any remote learning arrangements.
- 10.4. Members of staff involved in remote teaching will ensure they have a working mobile device that is available to take phone calls during their agreed working hours.
- 10.5. The school understands that children learning remotely have the right to privacy out-of-hours and should be able to separate their school and home lives – communication is only permitted during school hours.
- 10.6. Members of staff will have contact with their line manager once per week.
- 10.7. As much as possible, all communication with children and their parents will take place within normal school hours.
- 10.8. Children will have verbal contact with a member of teaching staff at least once per week via a phone call.
- 10.9. Parents and children will inform the relevant member of staff as soon as possible if schoolwork cannot be completed.
- 10.10. Issues with remote learning or data protection will be communicated to the class teacher as soon as possible so they can investigate and resolve the issue.
- 10.11. The headteacher will review the effectiveness of communication on a weekly basis and ensure measures are put in place to address gaps or weaknesses in communication.

## **11. Monitoring and review**

- 11.1. This policy will be reviewed on an annual basis by the headteacher and governors.
- 11.2. Any changes to this policy will be communicated to all members of staff and other stakeholders.
- 11.3. The next scheduled review date for this policy is November 2021.

## **Appendix A - Remote Learning During the Coronavirus (COVID-19) Pandemic**

Within the ever-changing circumstances we are currently living through, we must be prepared for local restrictions. If local restrictions apply, the school will implement provision for remote learning to ensure children never miss out on education. We will ensure that our curriculum is inclusive and accessible to all. This policy annex outlines additional measures that will be implemented for delivering remote learning during the pandemic.

### **Legal framework**

1.1 This policy has due regard to all relevant legislation, statutory and good practice guidance including, but not limited to, the following:

- DfE (2020) 'Safeguarding and remote education during coronavirus (COVID-19)'
- DfE (2020) 'Adapting teaching practice for remote education'

- 1.2 The headteacher, in collaboration with the governing body, will ensure the school follows the legal obligations regarding remote education, as outlined in The Coronavirus Act 2020 Provision of Remote Education (England) Temporary Continuity Direction. This includes:
  - Providing remote education to all pupils of compulsory school age.
  - Providing remote education to pupils below compulsory school age who would usually be taught in a class with pupils of compulsory school age, e.g. Reception children.
  - Providing remote education where it would be unlawful, or contrary to guidance issued from public authorities, for a pupil to travel to or attend the school.
  - Having regard to government guidance issued regarding the delivery of remote education, e.g. the DfE's 'Guidance for full opening: schools'.

## **2 Contingency planning**

2.1 The school will work closely with the LA to ensure the premises is COVID-secure, and will complete all necessary risk assessments – results of the opening risk assessment will be published on the school's website.

2.2 The school will work closely with the local health protection team when local restrictions apply and implement the provisions set within their contingency plan.

- 2.3 The school will communicate its contingency plans for local restrictions with parents, including which children it will remain open to and which children will receive remote education.
- 2.4 The school will ensure that remote learning training is regularly refreshed for teachers, and that appropriate trouble-shooting support is available when needed, so the transition from in-person to remote teaching can be as seamless as possible if required.
- 2.5 If local restrictions are not applied, but a single class or 'bubble' needs to self-isolate, the school will immediately implement remote learning for that group as required.
- 2.6 The level of remote learning provision required will be based on the government's four tiers of local restrictions. Where there are no local restrictions in place, these tiers will not apply. The school will remain fully open to all those not required to self-isolate.

#### **Tier 1 local restrictions**

- 2.7 The school will remain open if tier 1 restrictions are in place, and remote learning will not be provided at this time.

#### **Tier 2 local restrictions**

- 2.8 The school will remain open if tier 2 restrictions are in place, and remote learning will not be provided at this time.

#### **Tier 3 local restrictions**

- 2.9 The school will remain open if tier 3 restrictions are in place, and remote learning will not be provided at this time.

#### **Tier 4 local restrictions**

- 2.10 The school will limit on-site attendance to just vulnerable children. All other children will receive remote education in line with section 3 of this appendix.

### **3 Teaching and learning**

- 3.1 The school will ensure staff and children follow the school's Online Safety Policy when working and learning remotely.
- 3.2 All children will have access to high-quality education when learning remotely.
- 3.3 The school will prioritise factors that have been found to increase the effectiveness of remote education. These include, but are not limited to:
  - Ensuring children receive clear explanations.
  - Supporting growth in confidence with new material through scaffolded practice.
  - Application of new knowledge or skills.
  - Enabling children to receive feedback on how to progress.
- 3.4 Teachers will ensure that a portion of their lessons are designed to promote interactivity amongst children and between children and staff, e.g. live lessons or use of the 'chat'

function on meeting software, to lessen feelings of isolation and to promote pupil progress and motivation.

- 3.5 Teachers will ensure lessons are inclusive for all children and can be adapted to account for the needs of disadvantaged children and children with SEND.
- 3.6 When teaching children who are working remotely, teachers will:
  - Set assignments so that children have meaningful and ambitious work each day.
  - Deliver a planned, coherent and well-sequenced curriculum which allows skills to be built incrementally.
  - Provide frequent, clear explanations of new content through high-quality curriculum resources, including through educational videos.
  - Assess progress by using questions and other suitable tasks and be clear on how regularly work will be checked.
  - Adjust the pace or difficulty of what is being taught in response to questions or assessments, including, where necessary, revising material or simplifying explanations to ensure children' understanding.
  - Plan a programme that is of equivalent length to the core teaching children would receive in school, ideally including daily contact with teachers.
- 3.7 All provisions for remote learning will be subject to the class group's age, ability and/or any SEND.
- 3.8 Teachers will continue to make use of formative assessments throughout the academic year, e.g. quizzes.
- 3.9 The school recognises that certain subjects are more difficult to teach remotely, e.g. music, sciences and physical education. Teachers will provide effective substitutes for in-person teaching such as video demonstrations.
- 3.10 Children will be encouraged to take regular physical exercise to maintain fitness, and time will be allocated within the school week for children to focus on this.
- 3.11 The school will remain cognisant of families who do not have access to the resources required for remote education, and will ensure that an up-to-date record of which children do not have appropriate devices or internet access is maintained.
- 3.12 The school will utilise the support available through the DfE's 'Get help with technology during coronavirus (COVID-19)' scheme.
- 3.13 Under the scheme, the school can order laptops, tablets and 4G wireless routers to support the following groups of children if they do not have access to a digital device or the internet through other means:
  - Children in Years 3 to 11
  - Clinically extremely vulnerable children across all year groups who are shielding or self-isolating in line with government advice
  - Children in all year groups who are unable to access remote education whilst attending school on a hospital site

- 3.14 Before distributing devices, the school will ensure:
- The devices are set up to access remote education.
  - Appropriate safeguarding controls and support are in place to help children use the devices safely.
- 3.15 Once devices are ready for collection, the school will either arrange for them to be collected by children or their parents from school, or delivered to children' homes, ensuring infection control measures are adhered to as part of this process.
- 3.16 The school will approach remote learning in a flexible manner where necessary, e.g. ensuring that lessons, live or otherwise, are available to accommodate contexts where children have to share a single device within the home.
- 3.17 Where any live lessons are recorded, the school will ensure all recording procedures have due regard for the relevant data protection legislation, including the Data Protection Act 2018 and the General Data Protection Regulation.
- 3.18 The school will maintain good communication with parents to ensure that parents are aided in supporting their child's remote education.

#### **4 Returning to school**

- 4.1 The headteacher will work with the LA to ensure children who have been learning remotely only return to school when it is safe for them to do so.
- 4.2 After a period of self-isolation, or the lessening of local restriction rules, the headteacher will inform parents when their child will return to school.
- 4.3 The headteacher will listen to all concerns that parents may have about their child returning to school and will advise them of the measures in place to ensure the safety of their child.

#### **5 Monitoring and review**

- 5.1 This policy annex will be reviewed in line with any updates to government guidance.
- 5.2 All changes to the policy will be communicated to relevant members of the school community.
